Hello! It's that time of year! Pre-registration for The Upper Peninsula State Fair Market Goats.

Enclosed you will find information for making preliminary entries in the 2024 Upper Peninsula State Fair Junior Market Goat Show and Sale. The rules are a summary only, and official rules are published in the annual Exhibitor's Guide to Classes & Awards (Premium Book). There are numerous changes so please read over the summary rules very carefully.

This year's barn theme is Wild West/Outdoor.

Note the changes on the 2024 Preliminary Entry Form. This is the only form that will be accepted. You may make copies if needed, but do not use forms from previous years. **LATE OR INCOMPLETE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**

New this year is YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) certification which is due by June 25th. Each exhibitor must provide a certificate of course completion. Please see the YQCA attachment or visit the UPSF website where all the information for the program is under the Exhibitors tab. Do not miss the in-person classes offered by Michigan State University Extension beginning in January.

The Upper Peninsula State Fair will assign an ear tag after the pre-entry deadline. Ear tags will be mailed to the exhibitor with a copy being mailed to the leader. The ear tagging procedure helps maintain control over entries and prevents tagging at the fair. We appreciate your direct review of the entry forms to help reduce and eliminate attempts to enter a goat that does not qualify for the show.

DNA sample submission is required for all goats entered into the 2024 UPSF goat show and sale. Further information and instructions will be mailed to you along with the UPSF Ear tag. There will be a charge of \$15.00 for the DNA sampling, which must be paid at the time of the DNA submission. There will not be a charge for the alternate goat; however, you must submit the DNA hair sample from the alternate goat.

IT IS ALSO A REQUIREMENT THAT YOU INCLUDE THE FULL SCRAPPIE TAG NUMBER ON THE PRELIMINARY ENTRY FORM.

The enclosed parental/exhibitor code of conduct must be signed and included with your preliminary entry form.

The deadline for preliminary entries is May 31, 2024. Please contact us with any questions about the Junior Goat Show. Thank you for your help in making the Upper Peninsula State Fair Junior Goat Show a success!

Reminders:

- Please provide all information requested on the preliminary entry form and review for accuracy. The Code of Conduct must be signed by the parent/guardian and exhibitor and returned with the preliminary entry form.
- DNA SAMPLE(S) & YQCA WILL BE DUE ON JUNE 25, 2024. Cost is \$15.
- Final individual entries are due July 15, 2024, and MUST be entered online at https://upperpsf.fairwire.com.

 Make sure you enter the correct record keeping and showmanship classes.
- Every exhibitor must purchase a weekly pass, discounted junior exhibitor weekly passes will be available for purchase with your final online registration
- The goat show is Tuesday, 6pm, in the beef barn arena.

JUNIOR MARKET GOAT PRELIMINARY SHOW RULES

1. Preliminary entries must be received/postmarked by the U.P. State Fair, 1001 N. Lincoln Rd., Escanaba, MI 49829 on or before May 31, 2024. Entries must be made on the enclosed Preliminary Entry Form for the Junior Goat Show and Market Sale. (Entries should be made by club or group, if belonging to a club/group.) The preliminary entry form must be completed in its entirety. Entries received after May 31, 2024, will not be accepted. Please note that complete breeder information must be included. (Name, address and phone number)

2. <u>FULL SCRAPPIE TAG NUMBER MUST BE INCLUDED ON THE PRELIMINARY ENTRY FORM FOR ALL 2024 JR. MARKET GOATS.</u>

- 3. **DNA Hair Sample is required.** Detailed instructions and an official DNA Sample ID card will be mailed to each registered exhibitor after the May 31, 2024, deadline. The cost will be \$15.00 for each market goat entered, and \$0.00 for each alternate market goat entered. The DNA hair sample is required for the alternate goat; however, there is no charge for the alternate DNA sample. The deadline for returning the DNA sample and the DNA processing fee is **June 25, 2024.**
- 4. Final entries to show at the fair must be made individually, online at https://upperpsf.fairwire.com July 15, 2024. Entry must show proper animal identification. You must also register for the correct showmanship class and record keeping classes.

In order to participate in the Jr. Market Livestock competition and sale, exhibitors are required to show his/her own animal in their age-appropriate Showmanship class.

- 5. The Upper Peninsula State Fair reserves the right to deny, accept conditionally, and to cancel any entries and awards of prizes without claims for damages.
- 6. Competition is open to any Michigan resident between 8 years of age through the person's 19th birthday. An exhibitor's official fair age is the exhibitor's age on January 1 of the year of the fair.
- 7. Entry weights must be taped or scaled at start of feeding program from a 4-H leader. If the exhibitor is not a 4-H member, the entry weight must be verified by a responsible party (parent, guardian or self if over 18 years of age).
- 8. The State of Michigan regulations require all goats to be tagged with an official Scrappie tag. Goats arriving at the Upper Peninsula State Fair, without the official Scrappie tag will be refused entry.
- 9. All market goats must have been born after December 1, 2023.
- 10. In order to participate in the Jr. Market Livestock competition and sale, exhibitors are required to submit a completed Market Livestock Record book for each animal. The record book can be found on the MSUE Delta County or the U.P. State Fair website. Records should begin on the day the exhibitor takes possession of the animal. All goats must have been owned by junior exhibitor for the entirety of the project and may not be sold at any time during the project, housed in Michigan for the duration of the project, and must have been in his/her care prior to May 31, 2024. Failure to turn in the Jr. Market Livestock Record Book to the sheep/goat office no later than 1 p.m. Monday of fair week, will result in disqualification from the Market Class. The final weight may be determined by tape measure or scale at home or the fair. This will allow the exhibitor to complete the record book prior to the fair.

11. All goats will be identified by a UPSF ear tag, and the Scrappie tag. The Upper Peninsula State Fair will furnish an ear tag after May 31, 2024, for each goat entered.

In the event a UPSF ear tag/Scrappie tag is lost, the exhibitor must call the fair office immediately. There will be a \$20.00 fee for a lost UPSF ear tag or Scrappie tag, which must be paid prior to unloading the goat at the UPSF. Please have the previously assigned UPSF/Scrappie tag number available. The goat will be automatically selected for DNA testing. The exhibitor will be mailed a "request for change from original registration form". The procedures to follow will be clearly outlined. The completed form must be in the exhibitor's possession before they will be allowed to unload the goat on the UPSF fairgrounds. If an animal arrives at the fair without both of the correct identifying tags, it will not be allowed to enter the fair.

- 12. Exhibitors are limited to exhibit one market goat only in the show and sale. Exhibitors/families may enter an alternate goat. Grand and Reserve Champion Goats are required to be sold at the Jr. Market Livestock Auction.
- 13. Junior market livestock exhibitors may exhibit more than one species but shall be allowed to sell only one market animal, in addition to any/all Grand or Reserve Champion Market Animals.
- 14. The superintendent may exclude an animal from competition if there is an unnecessary or embarrassing delay by the exhibitor bringing the animal into the show ring. If an animal is not shown in its respective class, it will not be allowed to sell in the Junior Market Livestock Sale and premiums will be forfeited.
- 15. No drugs shall be administered to livestock that are prohibited by State or Federal regulations. Animals under the care of a licensed veterinarian and/or taking any type of performance enhancing medication which may include but is not limited to steroids, diuretics, anti-inflammatories, tranquilizers, and pain killers are ineligible for competition, show, and sale. Exhibitors are responsible to read all product labels to make sure they do not contain such ingredients. Exhibitors must be aware drug residue may be found in the system longer than the labeled withdrawal time. Adequate time must have passed so the animal does not test positive for drugs during any testing during the fair or at the time of slaughter. Animals must remain free and clear of all such drugs during the fair or be disqualified from competition, awards, placements, ribbons, or sale. Animals requiring such treatments during the fair may be allowed to remain for public display only at the discretion of the superintendent and the UPSF staff veterinarian. Animals needing treatment outside of 12 hours before competition and during competition or sale, may receive treatments administered under the supervision and direction of the UPSF Veterinarian with consultations with Department Superinten dent, UPSF Management, and owner/parent. All questions should be directed to the UPSF Exhibitors Manager. The following practices are NOT allowed at the UPSF: the ingestion, injection or insertion of ANY material into an animal for the non-medical purpose to modify the conformation or appearance of the animal. This includes drenching.
- 16. GOATS ARE TO REMAIN UNCOVERED ON THE TRAILER AND MUST BE VISIBLY CHECKED BY SUPERINTENDENT or STAFF PRIOR TO UNLOADING. Animals with visible signs of warts, fungus, sore mouth or prolapse will not be allowed to exhibit.
- 17. Goats must be weighed and penned between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 11, 2024
 - **A.** Goats will be weighed for weight classification Sunday <u>upon arrival</u> at the fair. Goats must have a minimum weight of 60 lbs. to be eligible for show and sell.
 - B. If a market animal does not make minimum weight the following options are available: Option A— If the exhibitor has an alternate animal, they are allowed to get their alternate as long as they can arrive back at the fairgrounds before the scale closes at 5:00 pm. If they do not have an alternate or choose not to get their alternate, then they can utilize Option B— Animal is required to go into the barn or designated area and could be fed and watered. They would have until the scale closes at 5:00 pm to re-weigh and make weight. Should the animal not weigh the minimum required, the animal will be removed from the scale, scale will be balanced, and the animal will be immediately re-weighed. This is the final weight. If an animal is disqualified before it crosses the scale the exhibitor may choose to get their alternate animal as long as they can arrive back at the fairgrounds before the scale closes at 5:00 pm.
 - **C.** There is no allowed scale tolerance when weighing in market animals and final weight is not allowed to be protested.

18. MARKET GOATS SHALL NOT LEAVE THEIR DESIGNATED AREA AS DEFINED IN THE PREMIUM BOOK.

- 19. Market goats must be at least 50% meat breed (ie Boer, Kiko, Saneen).
- 20. Goats exhibited in market classes shall not be exhibited in breeding classes.
- 21. Market goats can be of either sex.
- 22. No training spikes will be allowed or used at the show.
- 23. Animals with testicles, portions of testicles or yearling teeth will be disqualified.
- 24. Horns are optional.

25. If the Grand Champion is disqualified, the Reserve Grand Champion will become Grand Champion, and the 3rd place animal will become Reserve Grand Champion. If the Reserve Grand Champion is disqualified, the 3rd place animal will become Reserve Grand Champion. If both Grand and Reserve Grand Champion are disqualified, the 3rd place will become Grand Champion. No other animals will be advanced. This rule applies only to the market steer, market lamb, market swine and market goat shows.

26. New this year is YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) certification which is due by Warch 15th: Each exhibitor must provide a certificate of course completion.

27. Showmanship age classes:

- a. Class 280 Seniors (17-19 years old)
- b. Class 281 Intermediate (14-16 years old)
- c. Class 282 Juniors (11-13 years old)
- d. Class 283 Beginners (9-10 years old)

Subject: YQCA certification for 2024 UPSF

The Upper Peninsula State Fair Authority is pleased to announce the addition of a new program for the 2024 U.P. State Fair!

What is YQCA?

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals is a national multi-species quality assurance program for youth. YQCA is designed as an annual education and certification program focused on food safety, animal well-being and character awareness.

How is YQCA managed and funded?

YQCA is a nonprofit governed by state university extension specialists, representatives of the livestock industry and a livestock show representative. Funds for the program come from checkoff funds from beef, pork, sheep and corn producers, which exhibitors contribute to through the Jr. Market Livestock sale.

Who will be required to be YQCA certified?

All 2024 U.P. State Fair junior market livestock exhibitors: beef, swine, lamb, goat, poultry, and chicken eggs.

How does an exhibitor get certified?

The program is offered online at yqcaprogram.org. or Michigan State University Extension will be offering in-person instructor led trainings throughout Michigan.

How much does certification cost?

Online cost is \$12.00 per person, in-person training cost is \$3.00 per person.

How long does it take to get certified?

The training generally takes 60 minutes.

How long are certifications good for?

Certifications are good for one year and must remain active for the dates of the Fair.
